Key achievements 2024-25:

- The school achieved the Sainsburys School Games Bronze Award for the second successive year.
- The school took part in the TCS Mini London Marathon in Schools for the first time, with every pupil completing the two mile course.
- We entered a team into every event organised by the local SGO.
- The school cricket team reached the county finals for the second successive year.
- The boy's football team were crowned the Lincoln Primary Football League 'West' Division Champions.
- The girl's football team finished third in their division.
- The school finished third in the indoor athletics.
- Play leaders were successfully trained and implemented throughout the year raising physical activity at break times and lunch times.
- The school's extracurricular programme continued to expand with increasing numbers of pupils taking part in extracurricular activity.
- Further CPD was provided by Lincolnshire Cricket and LEAD teaching school for staff, developing their confidence in delivering sessions.
- Enrichment days and fitness fortnight were real success stories. Children were introduced to new sports and physical activity and many have now joined these clubs in the local area.
- Drumba and Golf were so successful that we have purchased new equipment, ready to roll out as part of our curriculum offer next year.
- Our partnership with the Lincoln City Foundation continued to develop providing more football opportunities for all children.
